SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE



Greetings from me and the Provo City School District. I hope you are having an enjoyable summer!

We issue this publication every summer to the residents of Provo in an effort to keep you informed about happenings within the school district. We try to be very careful with our finances so we don't send newsletters as often as we would like. However, please be aware that Provo City School District has a website that is updated regularly (http://provo.edu), and we also have Twitter, Instagram and Facebook pages. We encourage you to check in with us regularly through any or all of these sources.

The 2016-2017 school year was an exciting, eventful year. I do not have space here to outline all of the many accomplishments, but here are a few:

- We opened 2 newly constructed elementary schools, Rock Canyon and Sunset View.
- Thirteen (13) of our eighteen (18) schools received either an A or a B on the state's new school grading system, even in a year when the cut scores were raised and it was more difficult to earn high grades. Comprehensive improvement plans were implemented at the other four (4) schools.
- Ten (10) National Merit Scholarship program-honored students.
- 950+ students district-wide comprised the district's graduation class of 2017.
- Our Title 6 program hosted the first ever Native American Youth Pow Wow in our district. It was very well attended and featured Billy Mills, an Olympic Gold Medalist.
- We recently hired Provo City School District's first "Equity and Diversity Coordinator" to help us understand and meet the needs of students from various cultures and backgrounds.
- We completed the 17th annual Easter Basket Auction that raised over \$160,000. 100% of these funds will go to support students in after-school programs and intervention opportunities. With the generous time and support of local businessmen Brent Brown, Dan Campbell, and Tracy Rawle as the leaders of this auction, the past 17 years has generated nearly two million dollars of support to our school district.
- The Provo Adult Education program graduated 101 students so far in 2017: 68 credit diplomas and 33 GED diplomas.
- Nearly 1,300 AP exams were administered, another significant increase over the previous year.
- Administered anti-discrimination and anti-bullying training at all sites throughout the district.
- Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) awards from Government Finance Officers' Association (GFOA) and Association of School Business Officials (ASBO). This makes 14 years in a row for the budget award from GFOA and 9 years in a row (10th year is pending) for the award from ASBO.
- On the state assessments reported in Fall 2016, district scores met or exceeded state averages in 24 of 27 tested areas.
- Selection of the district's Child Nutrition program as Best of State in Utah for the eighth consecutive year.
- 84 student candidates for state Regents Scholarships (formal notice of recipients has not been shared with the district as of this date).
- We have 121 sections of concurrent enrollment offerings, with 1,325 students enrolled and earning 3,709 credit hours of total college credit. The on campus cost for these hours would exceed \$5,000,000 in tuition .
- Seven students earned associate of science degrees concurrently with their 2016-17 high school diploma.
- 152 students earned 244 pathway completion cords at high school graduation for their work in taking courses in a designated Career and Technology Education (CTE) pathway.
- A student run art gallery has been created in cooperation with the Provo Towne Centre Mall to display student, alumni, and staff work and provide a wonderful internship opportunity.

In August 2017, we will be opening the doors of the new Edgemont Elementary School. As I write this, construction of the new Provo High School is still underway with a planned opening date in early August 2018. In early summer 2018, we expect to formally open the new Provost Elementary School as well. With both Provost and Provo High, all five schools from the 2014 school reconstruction bond will have been completed.

Although we have had several great years in terms of student achievement and overall district improvement, our desire is to always find areas where we can increase and then, in turn, accomplish those successes as well. We take this stewardship very seriously: for our community, for our taxpayers, and especially for our students.

Best wishes to you and yours for the remainder of the summer. Please remember to keep up-to-date by checking the online sources I mentioned above.

Construction Update



Work continues on building the new Provo High School, Edgemont Elementary School and Provost Elementart School. The completeion of these schools, along with newly opened Sunset View Elementary and Rock Canyon Elementary, will conclude the work done with the voter approved bond in November of 2014. We are continually grateful to the citizens of Provo for allowing Provo Cith School District to provide these new buildings for Provo students.

Edgemont Elementary

Teachers will have access to set up classrooms beginning Friday, August 4th, 2017. Construction crews are currently working 6 days a week, 12 hours a day to reach deadlines for August 2017. Along with cabinetry crews, painters, plumbers,

Please continue to check provo.edu/school-construction-projects/ for updates on the progress being made at each of the schools. electricians and mechanical contractors, there are also ceramic tile crews working in restrooms and kitchen areas. Concrete contractors and site excavators are also progressing with site concrete curbing, playground areas and parking lot prep work. The 3 new playground areas will be complete with new playground equipment for kindergarten, 1st through 3rd grades and 4th through 6th grades by the time school starts in August. Student dropoff and pick-up locations will be shared with the Edgemont Community Council and PTA by August 4th. New desks and tables for classrooms will be delivered to Edgemont by July 25th. MHTN Architects and their Engineering Team continue to provide requested details to the Edgemont administration and Community Council. Hughes Construction is the Construction Manager. Their experience with school construction throughout Utah has been valuable to the success of the Edgemont project.

Provost Elementary

Excavation, concrete and masonry crews continue to progress well at the Provost project. Plumbers and electricians are also working daily to install under-slab systems. Major utility lines for fire line supply have been replaced and installed at connection points leading from 900 East to the adjusted Provost site. MHTN Architects and their engineering team continue to coordinate and implement input from Provost administration, school board representation and community recommendations. Hogan Construction is the Construction Manager for Provost. Their expertise with building schools on acreage-challenged sites has been a significant advantage for the Provost project.

Provo High School

FFKR Architects and their Engineering team continue to coordinate with PHS administration and faculty for efficient designs. Backstops for baseball and softball fields are installed. Landscaping crews continue to install sprinkler systems at the new baseball, softball and practice field areas. The new tennis courts are installed with fencing. There will be 8 new courts for PHS which will allow them to host Region Tennis

events. Structures for 3 academic wings are in place. CTE / Shop areas are well underway at the north end of campus. Exterior Glass systems are being installed, brick veneer installation is also underway and significant progress is being made with the new Performing Arts area of campus. Progress also continues with new road access to the north of campus, 1280 North, and a future road leading south west, which will have access from the student & visitor's parking lot on the south end of campus. Both of those new roads will eventually connect to the new Parkway that will lead north and south to the west of the new PHS campus. Westland Construction is the Construction Manager. Their overall expertise with construction scheduling and financial management continues to help maintain project guidelines within budget and scheduled completion.

SCHOOL REGISTRATION INFORMATION

Kindergarten and New Elementary Student Registration

Pre-registration for all new students in kindergarten through sixth grade and those not previously registered, will be done through the online registration system. Visit grades.provo.edu for detailed information to access the online registration.

If you are in doubt as to which school to attend, please contact Student Services at 801-374-4838 for assistance in English or Spanish, your school's office or visit the Provo City Geographical Viewer at https://provo.edu/school-boundary-locator/

By state law, no student may attend kindergarten unless the child is five years old on or before September 1, 2017. Parents registering kindergarten children or new students to the district must bring an original birth certificate (not a copy), an upto-date record of immunizations, and proof of address. Please contact your child's school to submit these documents.

Online Registration for New and Returning Students

Provo City School District utilizes an online registration system. This system will allow you to enter your demographic data for new students. You may access the online system from any place with Internet access. For detailed instructions on how to access the online registration, visit grades.provo.edu and click on the "New Student Registration" tab.

All returning students can access and/or update demographic data from the Parent Portal Account in PowerSchool from August 10 through September 15. If you do not have an account, visit grades.provo.edu and click the "Create Parent Account" tab to find step-by-step instructions.

A returning student is one that was enrolled on May 26, 2017 in a Provo City School District school. If the student was absent prior to this date they are still considered enrolled. If you withdrew your student prior to July 15, they will need to register as a new student. Please contact either Student Services at 801-374-4838 for assistance in both English and Spanish or your school's office.

Centennial Middle School Information

New Students: Students who have moved into the Centennial boundaries, or have been accepted on School Choice, and have not had an opportunity to fill out a preliminary class schedule, may do so on August 2-4, from 8:00 a.m. until 3:00 p.m. The following documents are required for registration: birth certificate, immunization records, and proof of resi-



dency (mortgage or rental agreement, or a current utility bill which includes gas, power, or Provo City). Please call 801-370-4621 for more information.

Dixon Middle School Information

Registration: Please follow the online process outlined in this newsletter to know how this is to be done. We request that parents/guardians update/verify students' information online before school begins. Fee payment information is delivered by mail. Fees may be paid and registration finalized by mail or online through August 18.



New Students: Students who have moved

into the Dixon boundaries, or have been accepted on school choice, and have not had an opportunity to fill out preliminary class schedule may do so on August 3-4. You may come to the library from 8 a.m. until 2 p.m. The following documents are required for class scheduling: Birth Certificate, immunization records, and proof of residency (mortgage or rental agreement, or current utility bill).

Incoming 7th grade students must have a Tdap booster as well as a Varicella shot or previous history of chicken pox. Please call 801-374-4980 for more information.

Returning Students: Students who receive incomplete schedules in the August 4th mailing, or are seeking to make a schedule change should visit the counseling office beginning August 7th to complete their schedule from 8 a.m. - 2 p.m. daily.

7th Grade Orientation: All students new to Dixon may attend Camp Dixon on August 7th to make new friends and learn more about Dixon. Students can choose to attend a morning session from 8:30 a.m. - 11:30 a.m. or an afternoon session from 12:30 p.m. - 3:30 p.m.

Early Intervention Preschool Information

PCSD is now offering a tuition-based preschool located at Sunrise Preschool. Sunrise serves students with disabilities and is looking for typical peers that can model age appropriate skills. The curriculum follows the state approved standards and is an excellent learning environment with highly trained teachers and staff. The preschool is Mon-Thurs and the tuition is \$80 a month for either M/W or T/Th AM or PM sessions. Students that have turned 3 before September 1st through students that will turn 5 before September 1st, and are toilet trained and able to model good communication and behavior skills, will be eligible. For more information, please contact Sunrise Preschool.

Title I Preschool Information

The district is excited to continue offering Title I Preschool at four locations this Fall. The preschool classes are currently full for this school-year. However, screening for possible placement/waiting list will continue throughout the school year.

- Provo Peaks Elementary will serve Provo Peaks and Timpanogos students
- Franklin Elementary will serve Franklin students
- Spring Creek Elementary will serve Spring Creek and Provost students
- Sunset View Elementary will serve Susnset View and Amelia Earhart students

Eligibility Requirements:

- Students must live in the boundary of a Title I school
- Students must be 4 years old by September 1st of the current school year
- Students qualify for the program though a screening process; students who are most at-risk of meeting standards will have priority placement

Fee Waivers

Fee Waiver Applications are available at: www.schools.utah.gov/law/Forms.aspx Parent(s)/guardian(s) shall provide income eligibility documentation in the form of income tax returns or current pay stubs demonstrating compliance with requirements. Fee Waiver applications and income documentation should be turned in to the middle school and/or high school that the student(s) attends. Fee Waiver eligibility is determined at the school site. See Fee Waiver Application for more details.

Immunizations

Utah law requires that school records include complete immunization records. Records must include documentation of the day, month and year for each immunization.

Kindergarten and First Grade Entry Requirements

The following vaccines are required for students entering Kindergarten:

- 5 DTP/DTaP/DT 4 doses if 4th dose was given on/after the 4th birthday
- 4 Polio 3 doses if 3rd dose was given on/after the 4th birthday
- 2 Measles, Mumps, Rubella (MMR)
- 3 Hepatitis B
- 2 Hepatitis A
- 2 Varicella (Chickenpox) history of disease is acceptable, parent must sign verification statement on school immunization record.

Second to Sixth Grade Entry Requirements

The following vaccines are required for students entering 2 through 6:

- 5 DTP/DTaP/DT 4 doses if 4th dose was given on/after the 4th birthday
- 4 Polio 3 doses if 3rd dose was given on/after the 4th birthday
- 2 Measles, Mumps, Rubella (MMR)
- 3 Hepatitis B
- 2 Hepatitis A
- 1 Varicella (Chickenpox) history of disease is acceptable, parent must sign verification statement on school immunization record.

Additional Entry Requirements for Seventh

and Eight Grades (*must have K* - 6 grade require*ments*)

The following vaccines are required for students entering seventh grade (these are in addition to elementary grade requirements):

- 1 Tdap

Family Educational Rights Privacy Act

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords parents and students over 18 years of age the right to inspect education records, the right to request amendments to records which are believed to be inaccurate, the right to consent to disclosures of non-public personal identifiable information, and the right to file a complaint regarding FERPA issues. Open Enrollment – School Choice

Parents interested in having their students attend a different school than their boundary school are required to fill out an application. Applications are available online at provo.edu/student-services.

Open enrollment begins Dec. 1st and closes the 3rd Friday in February. Notification of acceptance or rejection is sent by March 31st. Please note that it is against State Law to have waiting lists. Applications do not forward from year to year.

Provo eSchool is Provo City School District's online school. We offer a large variety of courses, including world language starting as young as third grade! Dual-enrolled students must receive counselor approval before including eSchool courses in their schedule. eSchool classes are part of a student's schedule, they are not supplemental. CAREER AND TECHNICAL EDUCATION (CTE) HIGHLIGHTS

Career and Technical Education (CTE) classes provide opportunities in our schools for educational concepts to come to life in the form of real-life practices and problem solving associated with today's modern STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) in businesses and industries. CTE provides students with the opportunity to explore a variety of career areas in their middle school and high school years that will equip him/her with the academic knowledge, technical and employment skills vital for entry into the evolving workforce of the 21st century.



Career and Technology Education (CTE) Highlights

- CTE is working to strengthen and build new partnerships with several area businesses, organizations and higher education partners to inform our students of the stackable nature of CTE certifications and degrees. CTE provides linkage to virtually all content areas and knowledge. It provides students opportunities to model and demonstrate the skills they learn in their education. This past school year, 152 students earned 244 pathway completion cords at high school graduation for their work in taking courses in a designated CTE pathway.
- Provo CTE has partnered with the Provo Towne Centre Mall, former alumni artists and the BYU Center for the Improvement of Teacher Education and Schooling (CITES) to provide a student run art gallery titled "Artcetera" in the Provo Towne Centre Mall. This location allows Provo students, alumni and employees a place to display their work in art and CTE courses. High school students will also have the opportunity to work in this space and learn how to set-up and maintain a professional art gallery and receive internship credit for their efforts.
- CTE is developing an aviation pathway in partnership with the UVU School of Aviation Science and Duncan Aviation. The first course in this pathway will be offered at Provo High School in the fall of 2017. Additional courses will be added according to student demand.
- Provo CTE is working with UVU to build and connect a pathway in Education to help students understand the variety of opportunities that exist in working in K-12 education and beyond. These courses will eventually align for concurrent enrollment credit and the pathway sequence and course opportunity will grow with student interests. Both Timpview and Provo High will begin these courses in the fall of 2017.
- CTE has begun meetings with Mountainland Applied Technology College (soon to become M-TECH) to discuss how to best partner in serving our students needs to receive professional licensure for employment in the new facility they will be adding in downtown Provo. MATC is centered on developing industry certifications linked to the most rapid and self-sustaining areas of employment in our community.



We appreciate the countless business, industry and higher education partners that also support us in our health care career day, comprehensive high school career fairs, middle school career exploration days and Reality Town events. We are providing a richer opportunity for our students learning because of the wonderful support we receive.

STEM Highlights

- Provo City School District has dedicated a space for STEM and CTE education at the Grandview Technology Center. Space in this location will be used to help teachers learn about STEM and CTE programs. Resources will be available for teacher checkout as well as training provided on content, STEM pedagogy and resources.
- The STEM Office will be working with existing STEM Schools and new schools wishing to pursue STEM strategies.
- The first STEM Endorsement cohort of 13 teachers finished in April of 2017 and funding has been secured through the STEM Action Center to add a second Elementary STEM Cohort in the fall of 2017. Applications for teachers are available upon request through the STEM Office by emailing jenni-ferr@provo.edu and will be sent out in late summer.

Look for STEM Professional Development throughout the year as more schools and teachers continue to develop their STEM interests, programs and implementation/integration strategies.
