

## SUPPORTING STUDENTS' SUCCESS IN TODAY'S WORLD

#### PROVIDING VOLUNTARY AND MONETARY RESOURCES TO MEET STUDENT NEEDS

The Provo School District Foundation is designed to further educational opportunities and services for students, teachers and families in Provo City School District. This is accomplished through raising funds to support a wide range of activites, including afterschool programs, scholarships for students and grants for teachers. It is through the generous support of community members and partnerships/businesses that the Foundation is able to accomplish it's mission and vision.

The mission of the Provo School District Foundation is to gain support from the community by providing both voluntary and monetary resources to meet the needs of the students.

The vision of the Provo School District Foundation is to create an environment in which there is community wide support for students' success in today's world.

As a Foundation, we fully recognize the positive influence effective afterschool programs have on the entire community (youth, families and businesses) served by Provo City School District. Afterschool programs can boost academic performance, reduce risky behaviors, promote physical health, and provide a safe, structured environment for the children of working parents.

- Attending afterschool programs can improve students' academic performance. A national evaluation found that over 40 percent of students attending 21st Century Community Learning Center programs improved their reading and math grades, and that those who attended more regularly were more likely to make gains (Naftzger et. al., 2007).
- Effective afterschool programs can improve classroom behavior (Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction, 2010), school attendance, academic aspirations, and can reduce the likelihood that a student will drop out (Huang, Leon, La Torre, Mostafavi, 2008).
- Participation in afterschool programs has been associated with reduced drug use (Investing in Our Young People, University of Chicago, 2006) and criminal behavior (UCLA National Center for Research on Evaluation, Standards and Student Testing, 2007).
- Working families and businesses also derive benefits from afterschool programs that
  ensure that youth have a safe place to go while parents are at work. Parents concerned
  about their children's afterschool care miss an average of eight days of work per year, and
  this decreased worker productivity costs businesses up to \$300 billion annually (Brandeis
  University, Community, Families and Work Program, 2004 and Catalyst & Brandeis University, 2006).

### FINDING WAYS TO RECOGNIZE AND SUPPORT TEACHING EXCELLENCE

The employees of Provo City School District are the lifeblood of the district. The Foundation recognizes the great work performed every day by each of these individuals and strives to support them whenever possible. Without their work in our schools each and every day, our students would not receive the high quality education that they deserve.

The Foundation has developed two opportunities to recognize these oustanding employees:

- Mini Grants
- · Evening of Excellence

#### **Mini Grants**

The Foundation awards 10 mini-grants each year to teachers in the district. In order to receive these mini-grants, teachers submit a two-page application explaining their idea for an innovative project to use in their classroom or school. The completed applications are then sent to the Provo School District Foundation Selection Committee, which then decides the mini-grant recipients for the year.

Winners are awarded \$500 in order to fund their project and are expected to write a brief report describing the project's outcome.







#### **Evening of Excellence**

Each year, six outstanding educators are recognized for their excellence and contributions to the education of students in Provo City School District. The educators are nominated by their peers and recognized at a formal dinner. From these nominations, one administrator, one classified employee and four teachers are seleceted to be recognized. The Foundation partners with local businesses and individuals to sponsor each recipient and the event.







#### A FRIENDLY COMPETITION WHERE KIDS ARE ALWAYS THE WINNERS!

Each year local businesses partner with the Foundation to sponsor the Links for Kids Golf Tournament. 




## A HIGHLY ANTICIPATED EVENT WITH ACCLAIMED COMMUNITY SUPPORT



### SUCCESS FOR AFTERSCHOOL PROGRAMS IS ACHIEVED TOGETHER!

Thousands of students participate in intervention programs each day in Provo City School District. The purpose of these programs is to provide assistance to those students who may otherwise fall behind in their studies. These programs are offered before, during and after school and provide students with the extra educational help they need to succeed, but may not be able to find elsewhere.

The following stories highlight the impact that these programs are able to have on Provo students, which is greatly enhanced by the generous donations of our community partners.



## **Afterschool Kindergarten**

Afterschool Kindergarten is provided for economically disadvantaged students, allowing students to participate in Kindergarten activities all day long and providing support to any deficits that poverty may cause.

"One of our kindergarteners came to school with severe anxiety. You could see her shaking to even be in the building. In being able to be with her teacher and other school personnel for extended periods provided by full-day classes, she was able to build relationships that built her confidence. She learned strategies to deal with

the anxiety that separation caused. She is at the top of her class and even looks forward to helping her peers be successful as well." ~District Principal

## **Tutoring**

Tutoring is a chance for students to get extra help after school to master concepts taught during the school day.

"As a teacher, I was so grateful to have the afterschool program to supplement and reinforce what was being taught in my classroom. Last year, I had a student that got little to no support at home and struggled with math and reading in the beginning of the year. He was at least one grade level behind in both subjects and I quickly referred him to the program. Throughout the year, he progressed from read-



ing around 25 words a minute to reading 95 words a minute by the end of the year! He became a much more confident and happy student as he came to love reading, math and learning in general. He was one of many that benefited greatly from the program. What a huge benefit it is to have supportive, capable adults to provide a safe place and extra help to students who may not have it otherwise." ~District Teacher



## STEM Programs

These programs allow students to participate in STEM activities such as coding, engineering, space missions, etc. to prepare them for the future. Many of these programs are not offered as part of the core instruction during regular school hours.

"For one fifth grade student, the coding class was his first experience with programming computers. One day, he asked me to help him with a problem he was having with one of the exercises. The solution to the problem required him to see it in a new light. In order to

work it out correctly, he needed to use 'multiple layer loops' which was a new concept for him. We worked through it step-by-step and he saw how he could solve the problem using this new concept. He was excited about having solved the exercise problem in what was an elegant fashion. I'm really pleased how he is grasping these new concepts and then applying them to the problems. He has been excited about the class." ~ District Teacher

# Credit Recovery

Credit Recovery takes place during afterschool and summer school. This allows students who are lacking credits for graduation to catch up with their peers.

"Last year, I worked with several students who were behind four or more for credits by the end of their senior year. With assistance from all of our staff, we were able to help them retrieve the credits through online learning packets and through working with their teachers on individual projects. We ended up having an additional nine students graduate that we did not expect.



Some of the interventions that we applied were pulling students in after hours, taking computers to students that have been donated from the community and businesses, working with BYU in developing online alternative options, as well as picking students up from their homes at odd hours of the day." ~ High School Administrator

#### **Classes for Parents**

Parents are provided with parenting classes, English Classes, driving classes, technology classes, etc. to help support the needs of the family and the communities they live in.

"We had a Driver's Ed course for parents. After the course ended, a woman came up to me. She thanked me for providing the class. She said her husband had been trying to pass the driver's test for many years. He had never been able to pass the written portion. Two days after the course ended, her husband was able to pass the exam and obtain his license." ~District Teacher

## **Homework Help**

Homework help supports both parents and students by providing an opportunity to complete homework after school with the assistance of teachers, para-educators or volunteers.

"I would like to thank the afterschool program for helping two of my students receive homework help and support, which made it possible for them to be prepared every day. Their homework was always done and correct. They do not have the help at home that they need to complete the homework so this program has been a great support for them. They struggle aca-



demically due to ELL struggles and having their homework complete and correct every day has been a great blessing. They are more confident and feel good about being prepared every day. They love to answer math questions in class when we correct the homework because they know the answers." ~District Teacher



### **Enrichment Activities**

Students of all ages are able to participate in enrichment activities such as art, theater, sports, dance and robotics.

"I joined [afterschool] volleyball senior year because I wanted something to remember my high school experience. I enjoyed volleyball so much because I got to meet girls and boys that I normally wouldn't talk to. The coaches pushed us to work very hard and, even though we sometimes doubted ourselves, the coaches and teammates were there to help you and lift you back up. There were a couple of times where we would bump heads with each other

and we wanted to pull each other's hair out. But, as soon as we stepped onto that court, that all goes away because we all play as one.

The most unexpected group of kids became a family and the coaches became our second parents. It's a second family that will always be there for you no matter what. If I could go back in time, I definitely would have joined earlier. It was such an amazing sport that improved my reflexes, coordination and my balance. I am now currently looking forward to play in college!" ~Independence High School Student

# Summer School

Students are able to participate in summer camps, enrichment activities and/or catch up on concepts they may not have mastered during the school year.

"Last summer, we had a new student enroll from Latin America. She did not speak English, so I signed her up for the ESL program that was being offered. After attending the class, she told me, "Wow! Those students talk like me!" In that moment, I learned how important it was for her to know that there were other students in the same situation as her. She



was not alone. She was very shy at first. After attending the ESL class, she was able to build friendships with the other students. The class even made plans to go to the rec center after school. I was very pleased to have offered ESL during the summer because we had a lot of new students who did not speak English. The class built their self-esteem and helped them be successful in the upcoming school year." ~Site Coordinator


