Yvonne Nsabimana, MPA

Yvonne Nsabimana moved to Belgium as a refugee in 1994 after losing her father and half of her extended family in the Rwandan massacres. After earning her BA, she relocated to New Orleans before coming to Utah as a refugee in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina. She holds an MPA from BYU, and a Masters in Education from WGU.

She now works at PCSD as a French Dual Immersion teacher, and dedicates her time to working with Ngoma y' Africa Cultural Center (a nonprofit organization she founded), serving as the advisory board for the Dean of the BYU Marriott School, and raising her 4 children.



Amber Mitchell, MPA

Amber Mitchel is a native Utahn. She has an BA from BYU Hawaii, an MPA from the University of Utah, and 10 years of non-profit experience. She has worked at the National MS Society, the American Red Cross, and currently works for the University of Utah.

She is an active member of the Black Advisory Committee at PCSD. As a mother of 3 biracial daughters, she understands the importance of representation and community.



Meligha Garfield, MPA

Meligha Garfield is the inaugural director of the Black Cultural Center at the University of Utah – a center that works to holistically enrich, educate and advocate for students, faculty, staff and the broader community through Black centered programming, culturally affirming education initiatives, and retention strategies.
